### introduction

The British company BTR plc. is a conglomerate of about 900 companies. It has a registered office in London, UK, as well as numerous other property in the UK, South Africa, Australia, Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Spain, Italy, Sweden, Finland, Belgium, Germany, Brazil, Argentina, China, Philippines, Malaysia, and the United States.

The company operates, through its subsidiaries and affiliated companies in five different business sectors: construction, control and electrical systems, industrial, transportation and consumer related activities.

With sales of £9,778 million in 1995, and an average number of employees of 124,491 BTR ranked 24th in the FT European 500 list. Of the European top 25 employers, the company held the 22nd position in 1995, and ranked number 20 in the previous year. In the list of UK's top 500 companies BTR ranked number 10<sup>1</sup>.

In 1991/92 sales of the top 65 producers of automotive components totalled over \$220 billion; BTR ranked 37th with automotive sales of \$1,860 million<sup>2</sup>.

In this company profile we will take a closer look at this very big company, with its many different activities, spread over the world.

### history

BTR Plc was registered in the UK May 18, <u>1898</u> as Leyland & Birmingham Rubber Co. Ltd. In <u>1969</u> the name changed to BTR Leyland Industries Ltd., on merger with BTR Industries Ltd. Three years later in <u>1972</u> the name was changed into BTR Limited, and ten years thereafter (January 4, <u>1982</u>) re-registered as public limited company (plc.).

From 1969 onwards many acquisitions took place in amongst others the rubber and engineering businesses as well as automotive product manufacturing. Fatati S.A. of Switzerland and Holland were acquired in 1972, specialists in manufacture of automobile and contract carpets. Serck Plc. and Hansen GmbH were acquired respectively in 1981 and 1982.

Since 1993 it seems to be the case that not only businesses were acquired but many were also sold (again).

The purchase of Formica Corporation for \$618 million was completed in January 1995. TOPPS was bought in the following month, for a total consideration of £16 million.

In July 1995 the (remaining) 38% minority interest in BTR Nylex was acquired. Other acquisitions in that year were: Varta (Germany) and Signalling Control (UK), assets of Roncari Industries (US), Delta Neu (France), and the Brazilian OSA. Divested in 1995 were Tilcon UK (aggregates), Dunlop Slazenger (Sports), Nunc Group (Healthcare), and Titan Petrochemicals in Malaysia.

1995 Also saw the opening of the new £6 million AVS Technical Centre in Germany. Recently (June 1996) BTR sold its British car carpet company BTR Fatati Ltd. to Collins & Aikman (US). Just a year before complete production capacity of this BTR Fatati company had been moved from Switzerland to Newcastle-under-Lyne, in the UK<sup>3</sup>.

In July of this year (1996) BTR bought **Vogt Valves** in Kentucky, US, manufacturer of low-pressure valves. The company will be integrated with BTR's Edwards Valves business in North Carolina. BTR has annual valve sales of £250 million.

The Automotive Engineering Group (part of transportation sector) was established in Edegem, Belgium in 1991. The new group had to coordinate the activities of Hansen Transmissions International; as well as the activities of the automotive group mainly in the UK, and the BTR and Dunlop activities in Africa. In 1991 this automotive engineering group consisted of 37 companies, with total turnover of BFr.20,3 billion<sup>4</sup>.

In April 1993 BTR PLC brought four of its main belting plants under one umbrella, called the BTR Belting group. The new group became part of BTR's Polymer Products Group (Industrial business sector).

The belting group consists of **Dunlop-Enerka BV** of Drachten, Netherlands; **Dunlop-CCT SA** in Tournai, Belgium; and **BTR Belting Ltd.** and **Gandy Belting**, both in Farington, United Kingdom. Henk Reijneker has been named group managing director.

After the Annual General Meeting held on the 16th of May 1996, Elwyn Eilledge took over as Chairman.

The Board consists of three key committees for specific items:

Audit Committee, consisting of all directors;

Nominations Committee, consisting only of non-executive directors;

Remuneration Committee, responsible for the Group's system of internal financial control.

All business units operate autonomously but within a framework of financial and operational controls and procedures established by the board. These procedures include: profit planning; monthly reporting of financial performance; and approval procedures for all investments!<sup>5</sup>

Companies within the group are only obliged to supply each other if the terms are as good as those offered by outside suppliers.<sup>6</sup>

### production

The BTR company operates through five major business sectors, with the following long list of activities:

Its <u>Industrial</u> businesses are involved in design and manufacture of motors, gear units, air moving devices, conveyor belts, marine hoses, hydraulic applications, automated baggage handling systems, power transmission components, diesel engineering equipment, industrial dust control equipment, batteries, and rubber and plastic products.

The company's <u>transportation</u> activities are engaged in production and distribution of replacement radiators, signalling systems, brakes, door and air conditioning systems for the railway industry.

<u>Construction</u> activities consist of supply and production of quarry products, crushed stone, concrete, pipes, metal building components, fashion panels, laminates, floor tiles, sealing systems, and others.

The company's <u>control and electrical systems</u> businesses developand supply electromechanical instruments, electro hydraulic subsea systems, turbine/diesel driven electric motors, power transformers, and lighting products.

BTR's <u>consumer related</u> activities sector is engaged in the supply and manufacture of high technology sports equipment, paper machine forming fabrics, press felts, wall coverings, glass containers, and disposable laboratory plastics.

There is a Wool and Carpet Group based in new Zealand, producing amongst others Feltex woolen Carpets.

The acquisition of minorities (38%) in its subsidiary BTR Nylex (to have 100% ownership), for \$2 billion, in July 1995 enabled BTR to develop complementary product areas. All acquisitions in 1995 were targeted at <u>businesses with growth opportunities</u> contiguous to the core groupings of the company. Examples of acquisitions in 1995 are, as was already mentioned: Varta, a German industrial batteries group and Signalling Control, a UK rail signalling company. Supplier activities were strengthened in South America, due to increasing demand by major automotive manufacturers.

BTR is known for its superb timing in takeovers of 'companies in trouble', and making them profitable in a short term. For instance:

Feltex, founded in the 1920s in Auckland, New Zealand, began exporting carpets in 1970, however in the mid-eighties due to a succession of ownership changes, export virtually ceased. Under the ownership of BTR Nylex, a new export drive is under way with sales targets of \$60 million in 1996. Recently Feltex carpets were laid in Las Vegas casinos, while the gambling went on.<sup>7</sup>

With the forming of a BTR belting group in 1993 (see chapter Structure) the Maniging Director Reijneker gave two reasons for establishing that group. The first was to ensure that each factory would use the resources of the group as effectively as possible, allowing good ideas developed in one plant to be transferred to other plants to improve quality and

reduce cost. Furthermore, the business is global, so it makes sense to bring all the factories under one umbrella.

The exception to this model is the Peter BTR plant in Hanau, Germany, which will continue to make conveyor belts. Reijneker said these are mainly destined for the German mining industry.

BTR's belting group employs about 450 people and has annual sales of about Dollars 336 million, although this varies when BTR wins large contracts.

The CCT plant at Tournai has traditionally concentrated on mining belts - and more recently on the high-technology solid-woven belts. With the demand for mining belts falling one of BTR's priorities is to increase sales of solid-woven belts into above-the-ground markets<sup>8</sup>.

**Huyck** is part of BTR, the UK's best performing share of 1991. Its forming fabric 347-G73 is made on seven harnesses with a G weave pattern and each yarn steps on three from its neighbour<sup>9</sup>.

#### strategy

The company pursues a strategy to create larger industrial manufacturing/engineering groupings.

Important goals are 'improving corporate performance and ensuring the highest standard of integrity', the Annual Report (1995) states.

Mr. Ian Strachan, who took over as chief executive in January <u>1996</u> signalled its plan to <u>sell BTR's plastic manufacturing operations in Taiwan.</u>

The company is establishing itself in high growth emerging markets like South America, South East Asia, and China where it produces PVC, Polyethylene, and styrene-based plastics.

BTR established or maintained leadership in key-market sectors such as Packaging, Sealing Systems, Batteries, Anti-Vibration Systems, Power Drives and transmissions, Laminates and more. <u>Divestment</u> of non-core businesses has accelerated in recent years.

Awareness of environmetal impact is an integral part of planning and management for BTR companies, the annual report states.

The UK firm BTR Fatati Ltd, specialized in production of automobile carpet (mainly for GM, Saab, and Toyota), has recently (June 1996) been taken over by the American Interior Textile Group Collins & Aikman. In 1995 BTR Fatati Ltd had realised turnover of £25 million<sup>10</sup>.

BTR has been many times in the press because of their rigorous accounting management style, short-termism and alleged agressive takeover policy.

When takeovers occurred it was generally with impeccable timing. For example when the Thomas Tilling group was taken over in 1983 its market value was depressed having lost £1,4 million. This depression however had been due to a heavy investment programme which BTR turned to its advantage, reaping £43.3 million in the first six months of ownership.

And Dunlop, having made a loss in the previous year, made £74 million in the first year of

BTR ownership.

One of the main reasons the Pilkingtons bid failed in 1987 was the fears of investors that BTR didn't have the commitment to R&D necessary to steer the company successfully. 11

Economic conditions were less buoyant in <u>1995</u> than expected in many markets. During the year the initial optimism had to be tempered. Nevertheless the profit for the financial year was up 10% to £960 million. Best performances were achieved by the Packaging Group. Investment was £644 million.

The 1995 divestments realised £501 million, while acquisitions in that year cost £2,571 million.

In the past decade total turnover of BTR Plc. increased almost constantly. Only 1994 showed a small decrease in sales, however profit did increase from 1993 to 1994.

In the analysis of sales per business sector we can see the relative importance of the different sectors for total BTR performance:

About 28% of turnover was realised by the Industrial businesses of the group, followed by the transportation activities which realised almost 23%. The best performing product group however was the packaging group (part of the Consumer Related business sector) which had sales between £900 and £1,000 million. Second best performing groups were 'Building Products' and 'Polymer Products' (Sales of £600 to £700 million).

In recent years the Group has been consolidating and restructuring around its core businesses.

As we can see in the following table: Of the total sales amount of £9,778 million in 1995, £768 million was realised from discontinued operations. Almost one-third of total sales in 1995 are realised in the Americas.

The analysis of sales by <u>market</u> is not materially different from the analysis of sales by origin as shown above, except for the Uk which has external <u>exports</u> of some £716 million in 1995.

As already stated the highest percentage of 1995 sales was realised in the Americas (31%), but when related to employee numbers, the importance of the Pacific area shows itself.

As we can see in the table above sales per employee in 1995 were highest in the Pacific region. However operating profit per employee was again highest in the Americas.

### employment

In 1995 BTR Plc ranked 22nd in the list of European top employers, in which 'top' was determined by employee numbers and not by quality of the employer.

During the period <u>1980</u> to <u>1982</u> BTR's workforce fell from 18,500 to 10,500. In <u>1992</u> the average number of employees was: 135,133. The following year this amount fell to: 129,814, to diminish even further with 5,323 employees in 1994.

In the UK the employee numbers have been diminishing over the last five years. In 1992 BTR employed an average of 49,543 persons in its home country (UK); while this number shrank to 45,624 employees in 1993. Also Africa saw a decrease in BTR average staff numbers. There in 1992 still 9,565 persons were employed.

The average BTR group staff numbers in the Americas and Asian region however increased over the period 1992 - 1996.

Staff numbers vary considerably between the different business sectors, with the transport sector being the biggest BTR 'employer'.

As we can see employment in the construction sector grew considerably with 3,500 employees from 9,500 in 1994 to 13,000 in 1995. In the industrial sector employment diminished with 500 between 1994 and 1995.

During takeovers in the past it occurred that isolation and frustration characterised the workforce concerned. All their grievances and enquiries were supposed to go to local management, yet it was others whowere taking the decisions. The problem was compounded by the fact that management at both levels seemed to take advantage of discrepancies between the company's actual and stated policy on decentralisation.

Bargaining with management is found very difficult in the past. 12

Six months after the takeover of Dunlop, BTR cancelled the national redundancy agreement that the unions within Dunlop had negotiated with the previous management. Substantial staff cuts took place. A majority of the workforce voted in favour of a strike, which however didn't take place.

The new redundancy terms were that agreements and pay rises should be negotiated on a site to sie basis and according to the profitability of each site. The creaming off of profits from each division by BTR's central management has lead to low wage settlements at sites that were performing well.

In the eighties disputes and strikes took place within the BTR group in the UK, in Trinidad, South Africa<sup>13</sup>, and Australia.

#### **EMPLOYEE COSTS**

The employee costs in 1995 amounted: £2,496 million, including directors' remuneration. In 1994 this was £2,445 million. Directors' remuneration was almost £4.8 million (almost 0.20% of total). Highest paid Director was A.R. Jackson with a total salary (incl. benefits) of £674,743.

At the AGM of May 1996 an increase in the aggregate total amount of directors' fees was proposed to a maximum of £250,000. Each non-executive director should get a per annum fee of £25,000, according to the proposition, because 'in the last few years increased responsibilities were placed in these directors'.
